Regular Meeting March 19, 2024 6:00 p.m.

The Herington City Commission met on the above date and time in the commission chambers at City Hall. In attendance were Mayor Eric Gares, Commissioner Robbin Bell, Commissioner Dan McDonald, Commissioner Dalton Scarff and Commission Cynthia Naylor. Also in attendance were City Manager Thatcher Moddie, City Attorney Brad Jantz, City Clerk Megan Lawrenz, Chief of Police Chad Langley, Fire Chief Andrew Avantagiato, Neighborhood Services Director James Masters......

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Gares called the meeting to order.

Public Forum - None.

Approval of Agenda – Commissioner Naylor made a motion to approve the agenda with the addition of 4a. Presentation of plaques to former Commissioners and 5a. Presentation from Abilene Memorial Health Systems, seconded by Commissioner Bell. Motion carried 5-0.

Consent Agenda – Commissioner Bell made a motion to approve the following consent agenda items Minutes of the Regular Commission Meeting March 6, 2024, Agreement for Mutual Aid between the Herington Fire Department DK202 and the City of Enterprise Fire Department DK305, seconded by Commissioner McDonald. Motion carried 5-0.

5a. – Abilene Memorial Hospital Announcement – They are just about done with the remodel and are starting to clean in preparation of the furniture getting installed next week. They offered a tour of the facility on April 2, 2024 and are hoping to open in early to mid-May.

Discussion on updating Charter Ordinance #19 on the Convention and Visitor Bureau, by reducing the number of members to 7 and expanding the qualifications to be a member. Commissioner Bell made a motion to approve the Charter Ordinance in the next sequential order and to authorize the mayor's signature, seconded by Commissioner McDonald. Motion carried 5-0.

CHAPTER 1 – ADMINISTRATION, ARTICLE VI – CONVENTION AND VISITOR BUREAU, SECTION 1-606 – CITY CONVENTION AND VISITOR BUREAU CREATED, OF THE CODE FOR THE CITY OF HERINGTON, KANSAS; SECTION 1-606 OF THE NOTED CHAPTER AND ARTICLE IS HEREBY AMENDED IN ITS ENTIRETY, TO REVISE AND REDUCE THE NUMBER OF ELECTORS MANDATED TO SERVE ON THE CITY OF HERINGTON CONVENTION AND VISITOR BUREAU FROM TEN (10) to SEVEN (7) MEMBERS; TO CONFIRM THE COMPOSITION OF THE CITY OF HERINGTON CONVENTION VISITOR BUREAU MEMBERS AS TO RESIDENCY REQUIRMENTS FOR PERMISSIBLE MEMBERSHIP AND SERVICE ON THE CITY OF HERINGTON CONVENTION VISITOR BUREAU; AND REPEALING ANY AND ALL OTHER CURRENT ORDINANCES OR PORTIONS THEREOF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

Department Head Reports -

Administrative – The city clerk gave an update to the commission saying that the end of the year tax filings have been completed, the 2024 budget expenditures have been entered into the system and she is working on entering the revenues. The Auditors will be here the last week of April, so city hall staff is beginning to get organized for their visit. Staff has started to prepare the 2025 budget requests to give to the department heads, and she will be attending the CCMFOA spring conference for continuing education the remainder of this week.

Police Department – The Police Chief brought up traffic on 77/56 especially with Casey's and pedestrians crossing the highway. He also mentioned the lake and that he is still trying to negotiate a way for the Herington Police Department to patrol and respond there. The new officers Trevor Mosher and Katrina Martin were introduced to the commissioners and community. There were 293 calls for service with 67 traffic stops, 6 misdemeanor arrests and 1 felony arrest.

Fire Department – There were 56 calls for service including 1 building fire, 4 grass fires, 40 medical assists, 2 motor vehicle accidents with injuries, 1 motor vehicle accident no injury, 1 EMS standby, 6 authorized controlled burnings and 1 smoke detector activation. Training topics covered wildland refresher and a saws class that had 8 attendees from the Herington Fire Department and 5 attendees from outside agencies. There will be a Stihl maintenance class coming up in July. Staffing updates include that there has still been a good turnout for calls, and there is one new application for a junior firefighter. Department updates include: the annual PM and inspection of all apparatus is complete. There were some problems identified that will cost \$4-6K in repairs. The county radio upgrade is still moving along, the next meeting will be April 1st for vendor selection, they are waiting on the engineer report, but the North Water Tower is the top location on the list. The department will be going to Herington and Hope High School for a mock motor vehicle accident demo in April.

UPTICC grants have been awarded to Gathering Grounds and Broadway Station. Mowing season seems to be coming early this year. Street crew will start to clean up the trail head soon. The raw water line project is underway. Had a KDHE inspection at water treatment plant and WWTP both passed. Reminder to the community to fill out the water line questionnaire, requested from State and EPA. Working on Pool preparation and set Memorial Day weekend as the season opener for the pool.

Commissioner Comments -

Commissioner Scarff – None.

Commissioner Naylor – Asked if city staff could help the community fill out water questionnaires if they need it. Asked about the swimming area at the lake.

Commissioner McDonald – Asked staff to provide information on registration fees for UTV/Pet fees/Golf carts.

Commissioner Bell – Asked that we get the lakes ready for summer (docks, camping spaces). And that we get the fountain at Father Padilla up and running.

Mayor Bell – Asked about the status of the Discs unlimited contract– staff plans to bring to the commission in April. Asked where the electric department is on moving their supplies into a secure location - Staff has three bids for the concrete right now and are working on fencing bids.

Adjourn – Commissioner Naylor made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Bell. Motion carried 3-2 with Commissioner Bell and Mayor Gares casting the dissenting votes.
